Re: No. 543 -- Katzenbach v. McClung

Dear Tom:

After careful consideration, I have decided that I can join your recirculation of November 27 if you will

1. Add at the end of the first paragraph, on p. 6, the following sentence: "And finally, there was plentiful evidence of the fact that discrimination created profound and continuing unrest with a resultant reduction in sales by business in general. Senate Commerce Hearings, at 699-700, 866."

2. Revise the portion of the first sentence in the next paragraph, beginning in the fourth line thereof, to read: "directly by it, that business in general suffered, and that many new businesses" et cetera.

I understand that you have already accepted my revised wording of the language on p. 10 relating to the Carlene Products case although it is not presently reflected in your recirculation.
