Dear Judge Justice:

This is in response to your letter of February 29, 1972, concerning the report filed on behalf of the Texas Education Agency (TEA) on February 3, 1972, in the above-captioned case. This report was filed pursuant to Section F(3) of this Court's orders of April 20, 1971, and July 13, 1971, and includes individual reports of sixty-nine school districts in the state in which there exist schools enrolling more than 66% minority group students; the cover letter to these reports indicates that there are approximately forty more school districts being surveyed, and reports will be forthcoming on these districts. We have reviewed those reports filed and the analyses of these reports contained in your letter. The following are our observations of those general areas of concern expressed in your letter.

1. Minority District - Consolidation: Twentysix of the school districts enroll over 66% minority group students. With regard to these districts we make the following observations:

- a. Unlike the nine all-black districts ordered consolidated by this Court in earlier proceedings (321 F. Supp. 1043), many of these 26 districts are adjoined by districts with high concentrations of minority group students. (Attached as Exhibit A is an analysis of these districts with the racial and ethnic composition of the surrounding districts.) Consequently, consolidation of many of these districts would not substantially reduce their percentage of minority group students.
- Each of the all-black districts consolidated under earlier orders of this Court enrolled less than 250 students. All but two (Pawnee and Hungerford) of the twenty-six districts enroll more than 250 students. Under Section F(2) of this Court's orders of April 20. 1971, and July 13, 1971, TEA was required to show cause why districts whose total student population is fewer than 250 students should not be annexed to or consolidated with other or more independent school districts of over 150 students, or one or more common school districts of over 400 students. so as to eliminate their existence as racially or ethnically separate educational units. While TEA filed reports on 32 of these districts in August and October, 1971, such reports on Pawnee and Hungerford have not yet been filed.
- c. In the case of each of the all-black districts consolidated by earlier orders of this Court, the Court made findings as to each district that (1) transfers

of students, and annexations and deannexations of school territory approved by or acknowledged by TEA, contributed to or perpetuated the segregated all-black districts, and/or (2) the physical facilities, curriculum and extracurricular activities, and the number and teaching assignments of faculty, all indicated that these districts were providing educational opportunities that were not equal to surrounding school districts that were predominantly white. These findings were made prior to ordering TEA and the Office of Education to consider the consolidation of these districts with the nearby, predominantly white school districts. The TEA reports on these 26 districts have not made findings as to these matters; so that we have no basis at this time for determining whether boundary lines of these districts were drawn for the purpose and with the effect of segregating children on the basis of race, color or national origin.

- 2. Minority Schools: The attachment to your letter indicates that seventeen districts have identifiable minority group schools. We have made the following observations:
 - a. Four of these districts (Eagle Pass, Kendleton, New Home, Sinton) have total enrollments in excess of 66% minority and the racial or ethnic identifiability of individual schools within these districts does not appear to be a result of discriminatory student assignment policy. One other district (O'Donnell 36.5% Anglo, 59.5% M/A and 4% black) has one 66% minority school. However, it is the only elementary school in the system and the student assignment policy is thus not discriminatory.

- Three school districts (Cotulla, Lamar and Sweetwater) have schools that are in excess of 66% minority group students because kindergarten, special education and migrant students are assigned to these schools. As explained in the TEA report, five year old students are eligible to attend kindergarten only if from low income families or educationally disadvantaged under state law. Thus. these students are largely from minority groups. Under state law kindergarten will become state-supported for all students over a five year period. Assignment of students to special education and migrant classes or school is discussed below under testing.
- c. The reports on the other nine districts with 66% minority group schools indicate that in some instances TEA made recommendations to desegregate these schools but that the district did not indicate whether or not it would take action. The reports do not make findings as to whether the racial or ethnic imbalance of these schools has resulted from state or local board policy or actions. In addition, we have been informed that some of these districts have been involved in negotiations with the Department of Health, Education and Welfare pursuant to their duties under Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.
- 3. <u>Teachers</u>: Your letter indicates that 38 school districts have teacher problems. We have made the following observations of these districts:
 - In 27 of these districts there is a disparity between the percentage of Mexican-American teachers employed by

the district in relation to the percentage of minority Mexican-American students in attendance. (See Exhibit B-I)

- b. In ten districts, while there is some disparity between the percentage of minority group students and minority group teachers, the number of minority group teachers is substantial. (See Exhibit B-2)
- c. In one district (Eagle Pass) the percentage of Mexican-American teachers in each school deviates substantially from the percentage of Mexican-American teachers in the system as a whole. (See Exhibit B-3)
- 4. Testing: Your letter indicates that 12 districts are "employing testing as a basis for student assignment, in apparent violation of the decision of... Lemon v. Bossier Parish School Board, 444 F.2d 1400 (5th Cir. 1971)." Our observations of these districts are as follows:
 - a. In six of these districts students are assigned to schools designated as special education schools, resulting in schools with 66% or greater minority group student bodies.
 - b. One school district (Eagle Pass) maintains an all Mexican-American migrant school for 74 students. Another district (Goliad) apparently has special classes for migrant children, but it is not clear whether these students are separated from other students.

- c. In four districts (El Campo, Gregory-Portland, Karnack, and Lorraine) we could find no evidence of assignment on the basis of testing in the TEA reports.
- 5. <u>Transfers</u>: TEA approved 33 students to transfer into Natalia ISD (9 Anglo and 24 M/A), and 71 students to transfer out of Natalia (63 Anglo students transferred to Devine ISD). The results of all transfers are as follows:
